A Very Busy Race 2025 Season

Since our last issue, we have hosted the "June Cup – Women at the Helm"; the "Corinthian Cup"; and the "Pirate Regatta – High Point Race 9".

First up, hosted a 4-race series for the June Cup – Women at the Helm every Tuesday evening in June! We had 16 registered boats across three classes: (1) PHRF A spin (8 boats), (2) PHRF B spin (2 boats), and (3) non-spin (6 boats). This race is a lot of fun as we have a variety of spirit activities each week! Week 1 is to decorate your crew and/or your boat in pink! Week 2 is to represent strong women! Week 3 is all about red, white, & blue! Week 4 is pirate themed....aaarrrrggg! Awards are presented each week, followed by a trophy presentation on July 23rd where the 1st place winners get their names added to the perpetual trophy and the overall spirit award is presented.

Overall winners for this year's June Cup were awarded to the following: PHRF A Spin 1st place to Kate Shaner for "White Knight Insanity"; PHRF B Spin 1st place to Karen Kuhn for "No Way!"; and Non-spin 1st place to Dorian Harris for "Oliver". Congratulations ladies! For the Spirit Award, 1st place went to Lisa Griffin and her crew from "Oasis"! The Race Committee also presented an Honorable Mention Spirit Award for a Unique Interpretation on a Theme to Molly O'Brien and her crew from "Expression Session". We also want to thank all the volunteers who made this series a success!

On July 19 and 20, we partnered with SCCYC to re-introduce the Corinthian Cup, a two-day series between King Harbor and Marina del Rey. This was historically an SCCYC sponsored event co-hosted by other Clubs over time. It had been discontinued in 2010. Although there was much anticipation for the reintroduction, the participation was less than hoped for primarily due to competing events. We had a Spin fleet with 3 boats and a Non-spin fleet with 4 boats. Day 1 went from King Harbor to Marina del Rey featuring a Saturday night party and food truck at SCCYC. Day 2 went from Marina del Rey to King Harbor. On August 3rd, an awards presentation took place at SCCYC featuring a nice brunch. Overall winners were: Spin 1st place to Robert Dekker for "Cuchulainn" and Non-Spin 1st place to Jennifer Kitchen for "Zephyr". Congratulations to the winners and to all participants!

Finally, we wrapped up our season with the Pirate Regatta – High Point Race #9 on Saturday, August 16th. The annual High Point Series consists of 12 races, six races each from each of our two harbors, King Harbor and Marina del Rey, where skippers accumulate points for each race entered. Due to the High Point competition, this race is one of our most attended regattas. This year we had 24 registered boats among 4 fleets: (1) PHRF A spin (8 boats), (2) PHRF B spin (4 boats), (3) non-spin (4 boats), and (4) One Design/Cal 20 (8 boats). The weather was perfect for the event. A ceremony followed up at the Club where trophies were awarded to the following: PHRF A Spin 1st place to Curt Johnson for "Avet"; PHRF B Spin 1st place to Don Souther for "No Way!"; Non-spin 1st place to Kevin Thornton for "No Worries", and Cal 20 1st place to Francie Hope for "Déjà Vu". Congratulations to racers and volunteers who made this event so much fun!

As we begin preparations for the 2026 race season, we are looking for volunteers to provide a Race Committee boat for one or more races, to help with back-of-boat tasks, or to coordinate afterparties. Catalina Classic 2025

The last Sunday in August brought the magic of the Catalina Classic Paddleboard Race back to life — and once again, it reminded me just how special this community truly is.

A Legacy Across the Channel

The Catalina Classic is the granddaddy of paddleboard races, first held in 1955 when a handful of pioneering watermen decided to see if they could paddle their boards the 32 miles from Two Harbors on Catalina Island to the Manhattan Beach Pier. What started as a test of endurance and ocean knowledge has grown into one of the most respected paddleboard races in the world. Today, athletes travel from across the globe to take on the challenge, carrying on a tradition that spans nearly seventy years.



This year, I had the privilege of connecting 32 paddlers with support boats — most of whom came from out of town — in one of the most complex, exciting, and rewarding logistical challenges I've ever taken on. It took weeks of juggling schedules, chasing down boats, solving last-minute breakdowns, and reassuring paddlers that we'd make it happen. And we did.

This race doesn't exist without boaters. Period. No support boat, no race. And this year, our club members and friends stepped up in a big way. Craig Allsopp, Frank Sandelman and his brother in law, Dan and Katie Gonzalez, and so many others captained boats and made a difference. I'm proud to say that PRYC played a huge role in helping these athletes chase their dreams across 32 miles of ocean.



A Moment I'll Never Forget

One of the most meaningful experiences of the weekend was working with Yurika Mitsui and her husband, who traveled all the way from Japan to compete. They barely spoke English, but we made it work — and with the help of the boating community, I found them both support boats.

Yurika went on to win the women's division with an incredible time of 6:31:47 in her very first Classic.

Coastal Cleanup at PRYC

Coastal Cleanup Day began as a grassroots movement in 1985 when the California Coastal Commission hosted the very first event to help keep trash out of our oceans. Since then, more than 1.6 million volunteers have joined forces across California, removing over 26 million pounds of trash from beaches and inland waterways.

What started locally has now grown into a global effort! Partnering with the Ocean Conservancy, Coastal Cleanup Day is celebrated internationally—in nearly every U.S. state and over 100 countries—making it the largest volunteer event in the world focused on the marine environment, and California's biggest annual volunteer event.





This year, Port Royal Yacht Club proudly joined the cause once again. Led by our enthusiastic Coastal Cleanup Captains, Annette Adam and Ria Rupp, about 50 volunteers turned out for a day of teamwork and stewardship. Our group included PRYC members, Junior Sandpipers and Sandpiper Mother-Daughter teams. Together, we had fun, built community, and collected a significant amount of trash from our marina and surrounding areas.

Coastal Cleanup Success!

A huge thank you to all the Port Royal Yacht Club (PRYC) members, families, and friends who joined us for the Coastal Cleanup. Your efforts helped make our marina community a cleaner, greener, and safer space.

Together, we collected 286.7 pounds of trash from the harbor and surrounding areas!

• Sue Morgan collected 3 bags of trash (23 pounds!) and uncovered some unusual items, including a car jack and a 1x4 plank with rusty nails.

 Junior Pipers Whitney, Marina, and London gathered 6 bags weighing 41.6 pounds — and even hauled out a 5-foot metal pipe!

• Junior Pipers Charlotte, Allegra, and Zairah collected 10.3 pounds and discovered an 8–10 foot drain pipe.

• Jony, Denise, Vaughn, and Sophia (Piper) collected 14 pounds of trash, plus another 50 pounds for their unusual find: a fiberglass-encased marine timber (approx. 4x12 in. by 5 ft), likely part of a dock fender beam or stringer.





Every volunteer made a difference, and we are so grateful for your time, energy and commitment to protecting our harbor. Thank you to everyone who participated—you helped make a difference for our harbor, our ocean, and our future.


Having participated in various club events over the past few years, the Klasers are no strangers to our club. The couple retired three years ago after successfully running Granny's Market in Hermosa Beach.
